

A commodity exchange is an organized marketplace where buyers and sellers trade commodity-related contracts, primarily futures. Unlike stock markets, it focuses on raw materials like metals, agricultural products, and energy. This mechanism provides price discovery, risk management, and a structured marketplace for commodity trading.

Bangladesh’s Journey Toward a Commodity Exchange

Bangladesh has long considered introducing a commodity exchange to align with global trading practices. The timeline highlights key developments:

- 2007: Initial feasibility studies conducted.
- 2017: CSE proposed the formation of a commodity exchange.
- 2019: BSEC reviewed the structural readiness for such an initiative.
- 2023: The "Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (Commodity Exchange) Rules, 2023" was published.
- 2024: CSE obtained the first license for a commodity exchange in Bangladesh.

Types of Commodities Traded

Commodities are broadly categorized as hard (e.g., metals, energy products) and soft (e.g., agricultural and livestock products).

Type	Examples
Agricultural	Coffee, wheat, soybeans, cotton
Energy	Crude oil, natural gas
Metals	Gold, silver, copper
Livestock	Cattle, beef

Why Establish a Commodity Exchange?

1. Risk Management: Hedging against price volatility.
2. Price Discovery: Setting benchmark prices for commodities.
3. Market Efficiency: Improving liquidity and transparency.
4. Economic Growth: Facilitating foreign investment and supporting producers.
